"SEMPER SURSUM"



He spoke with a low, gravelly voice, always willing to give you his opinion on political matters. He was always a lively conversationalist!

Robert C. Stephenson bid farewell to this world and passed into eternal peace on March 3, 2021. Bob was a member of VVA Chapter #351. He had suffered from the effects of Agent Orange with leukemia. This past year was one of severe physical strife and pain. Numerous transfusions were required to keep him alive.

In spite of his illness, Bob was usually upbeat and always ready to listen to

what you had to say. He was easygoing. Slow to anger. Able to assess any situation and lend a solution to its completion. He possessed a quick wit and a fine sense of humor. He was a kind human being. It was a pleasure to be in his company.

Bob served in the US Army with great pride. He was trained as a paratrooper.



His first assignment was with the 82nd Airborne in the Detroit riots. He then shipped out to Nam with the 101st Airborne. He is the only Vet I know that received 3 Bronze Stars! Amazing! That was Bob.

After his military service, he went to work as an electrician with the family business, Stephenson Electric, which later became Faith Technologies. His Dad, Clyde, served in the USMC as a Gunnery Sgt. He was a Pearl Harbor survivor from WW II.

Bob was always willing to teach and assist others. He ushered many apprentices thru the electrical journeyman process. He belonged to the VVA, American Legion, and VFW. He was a mentor in Vets' Court, helping other Vets in trouble.
